

Some definitions:

Manslaughter is a legal term for the killing of a human being, in a manner considered by law as less culpable than murder.

Battery is a criminal offense involving unlawful physical contact, distinct from assault in that the contact is not necessarily violent.

Burglary (also called breaking and entering and

sometimes **housebreaking**) is a crime, the essence of which is illicit entry into a building for the purposes of committing an offense.

Swindle: To cheat or defraud of money or property.

Blackmail: Extortion of money or something else of value from a person by the threat of exposing a criminal act or discreditable information.

Fishy: Inspiring doubt or suspicion

Muffled: made softer or less loud or clear

To charge: To instruct (a jury) about the law, its application, and the weighing of evidence.

To convict: To find or prove (someone) guilty of an offense or crime, especially by the verdict of a court

To sentence: to pronounce sentence on (a convicted person) in a court of law: *the judge sentenced the murderer to life imprisonment*

Handcuffs: A restraining device consisting of a pair of strong, connected hoops that can be tightened and locked about the wrists and used on one or both arms of a prisoner in custody

Trial: Examination of evidence and applicable law by a competent tribunal to determine the issue of specified charges or claims.

Accomplice: a person who helps another in committing a crime

To catch somebody red-handed: In the act of committing something wrong.



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
